PRESERVATION

An on-going effort of the Museum is the care and preservation of its thousands of artifacts, photographs and artworks. Without proper storage and maintenance, these important collections would not last for other generations to enjoy.

EDUCATION

One of the most important uses of membership dollars is the support of educational outreach programs. Museum staff travel across Oklahoma and the Southeast to bring creative, educational and fun programming to students K-12. Story-telling, cultural activities and crafts are just a few of the methods the Museum uses to bring to life the people and culture of our area.

ACQUISITION

Additions to the Museum's Permanent Collection of artworks and artifacts are funded annually through donor support, including such items as this this handcarved medallion by artist Dan Townsend.



EXHIBITION

Membership dollars fund special programs and exhibits, such as the Smithsonian national traveling exhibit, *Key Ingredients*, as well as shows celebrating the work of local and regional artists.

RESTORATION

In conjunction with grant funds provided through national foundations and other private sources, membership dollars make a significant impact in the restoration, renovation and maintenance of the Museum's historic home - the original Wewoka Community Center. Since 2007, over \$500,000 has been raised to repair and up-grade the Museum building in pursuit of our goal to preserve the historic work of the WPA while providing an effective, modern environment in which to share the story of Wewoka and the Seminole Nation of Oklahoma.
