2023 PROJECTS

Your support makes a difference!

Contributions from the April Shower fundraiser continuously impact everything we do. From expanding educational programming for youth, to enriching our public exhibitions, to enhancing the building and grounds, your donations to our Annual Projects are helping to grow the Seminole Nation Museum into a cultural facility with regional and state-wide impact. This year, the 2023 Shower is highlighting two important projects that will allow us to provide new and engaging programs for youth and improve and enhance visitor experiences during outdoor events.

Project #1 - Sorghum Day!



The Museum has been the heart of the Wewoka Sorghum Festival since we started the annual event with the Wewoka Rotary Club in the fall of 1976. For nearly five decades, the Museum has milled and cooked sorghum for thousands upon thousands of visitors from across the US and around the world. We offer traditional Native American foods, music, cultural activities, and arts-learning opportunities free to the public as part of "Wewoka's Big Day".

Undertaking these activities requires several various exterior properties and structures the museum has built or acquired since 1976. Rot, mildew, mold, and termites are just some of the many adverse issues these structures face. To meet the needs of the growing festival and to make possible other outdoor program opportunities, we are undertaking a \$20,000 project to repair and/or replace these structures. Contributions from the 2023 April Shower will:

- Build a new Sorghum Booth
 - Repair Fry Bread Booth/Concession Stand
 - Purchase additional public seating
 - Build a new sorghum oven and arbor
 - Repair existing band stand and stage

Project #2 - Education Endowment

In honor of the late Shermaine Noble Maillard, a distinguished educator and graduate of Wewoka's Douglass High School, her family and friends have donated \$18,000 towards establishing a Youth Education Endowment fund to benefit the Seminole Nation Museum. A total of \$25,000 is needed to create the fund at the Oklahoma Communities Foundation, so the Museum is working to raise the \$7,000 still outstanding. Once established, the endowment would provide annual funding for educational programs such as our annual Pioneer Learning for Area Youth Day (PLAY Day), Summer STEAM Learning Program, Sorghum Day, and more! Like the Museum's other endowments, the Maillard Fund would provide support in perpetuity for our programs.
